

A MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER, REV SANDRA MARSHALL

Dear Friends,

It is good to see that things are beginning to pick up following Lockdown and the continued effects of Covid.

Over the year we have enjoyed a variety of worship and some very good Local Arrangements arranged by the stewards. Some of the highlights have been the two baptism services at which 3 people were baptised. It is good to see that these families are joining us for worship too.



Another highlight was the Queen's Platinum Jubilee weekend which saw visitors from the village and the Circuit who enjoyed tea and cakes and fellowship.

The decorated Bollards have been excellent this year and, as well as seasonal knits and decorations, we have had lovely Jubilee and Coronation decorations. These have drawn much attention and encouraged some people to step inside church!

I am grateful for all those who have worked hard running our Church based events which have continued successfully – Men's Supper Group, Cuppa and Chat, Fun @ Church, Ladies Circle, New Horizons, Bible Study, Crochet and Craft Group, Mini-Mart and the Christmas Fayre.

We have continued the pattern of Churches Together in Barrow events beginning with the Remembrance Day service and parade at Holy Trinity, the Advent Service here, the Week of Prayer meetings and service at the Baptist Church and the Lent Lunches and Good Friday service here. Lent lunches were very successful this year and raised a large amount for two local charities supporting the homeless and people with mental health problems.

I am grateful to have a good team of Stewards who work very hard to ensure worship goes smoothly and offer good leadership to the Church. Two of our stewards, Heather and Sandra are due to retire and we are looking for replacements. Maybe God is calling you? I am very thankful for the stewards who offer all their "varied gifts and arts."

Also during the year we have met with Matt Forsyth, the District Mission Enabler to talk about how we can go forward as a church. His report was very encouraging. We are currently talking with the Circuit about whether there is a possibility of employing a children and young people's worker who could share their time between several churches – one being us! It is felt that some help developing Fun @ Church links and links with the Preschool would be good.

Most recently we have celebrated the Coronation.

I feel we have had a good year. Thank you to everyone who has served us well with their skills, time and gifts.

Looking to the future: Churches Together is planning to do some things a bit differently next. Watch this space! We are perhaps going to re-think some Christmas services and look forward to sharing God's love within and without.

Thank you all for the part you play in the life of the Church.

STEWARDS' REPORT

The 'enabling' of Sunday worship to take place is probably the aspect of stewarding that is most familiar to people. This involves contacting the preacher the week before the service, passing their order of service on to Natalie or whoever will be operating the AV system, and finding readers for the lessons if required. It also involves arriving early on Sunday morning to open up the premises and have everything ready and welcoming for the congregation, and to greet the preacher on arrival and attend to their needs. We are also 'on duty' for the whole of the service, watching out for any situation that might occur, and need to stay behind afterwards to make sure everything is in order before locking up when everyone has left.

In addition to the Sunday duties we also meet together with the minister every three months or so to discuss the life and ministry of the church, and as your representatives we would be glad to hear from you if you have any particular issues you would like us to consider. We are also members of the Church Council and responsible for implementing any decisions made at the meetings.


One duty that we had never expected to have was the regular planning of Local Arrangement services when no preacher is available. It is something that we have always had to be prepared to do in an emergency but not on such a regular basis, so we are very grateful for the amount of online and printed material available, and especially for The Vine complete services which can be downloaded and adapted to suit our requirements. We work together to plan these services and generally try to make them a different type of service, rather than just a 'normal' service without a preacher, so they are usually more informal with the chairs grouped around the coffee tables, and sometimes we take our tea and coffee in with us at the start. Most people seem comfortable with this arrangement and we are grateful for the amount of encouragement received.

Teamwork is an important part of stewarding, and we really do need more people to join the team. We all have different gifts and abilities and accept that not everyone is able to do everything, so don't be put

off if there are aspects of stewarding that you don't feel comfortable with. Please just have a word with one of us or with Rev Sandra to see what is involved, and then prayerfully consider if this might be a way in which you could serve the church.

Your stewards this year have been Sandra Webb, Heather Doda, Kate Morley and Natalie Thompson, and on your behalf I would like to thank them for their hard work during the year. I would also like to thank Natalie and Peter for operating the AV system, Janet for doing such a brilliant job with administration, and all those who help to enhance our worship by giving a warm welcome to people on arrival, providing and arranging flowers, preparing communion, making tea and coffee, or just 'mucking in' to do whatever they see needs doing. CROCHET AND CRAFT





FUN @ CHURCH

We have a regular group of 15-20+ very lively children attending with their parents, grandparents and carers. Their ages range from babies to 12 years. This gives us a challenging task to prepare the session each month so that every child will be able to take away some of the teaching. We do aim to have "fun at church" and judging by their return visit each month we must be doing that. We pray that some of our teaching, songs (particularly action songs), prayers, craft activities, and games will be an inspiration for them. We are so pleased that Leo, 15 years and Niall, also at Secondary School, who have been regular attenders since they were quite small, are now part of our team, proving to be reliable and valuable helpers, particularly to Mike in the Lego Challenge section.

The October session was "It's all about Fishing?" We focussed on how God calls us to tell others all we know about Jesus. To illustrate the theme we made and painted a box of an under water scene, made and painted clay fish, crabs and rocks. We also placed in paper created fish which were swimming and fishing nets in which some had been caught. We left it on the tables at the back of the worship area for you to see and admire! We made "yummy fishing rods" from bread sticks, sweet red laces and jelly worm sweets. A "sea" with various Lego people "swimming" in it proved that it is not as easy to fish as you might think.

In November we brought Christmas early and made a host of decorations covered in glue and glitter, woolly sheep, angels, Mary, Joseph, and edible baby Jesus in a crispy crib. We sang Christmas songs and invited everyone to our Christmas Services and Celebrations at Church.

In January the theme was "Are you willing?" which dealt with "inclusion" using the story of Jesus healing people with leprosy. In our craft work we illustrated how we must show and recognise acts of kindness and include others who sometimes feel left out. We talked about our feelings and made happy and sad faced biscuits. The Lego model showed children playing together in the playground, co-operating, sharing and including everyone.

In the theme "Heavenly Hope" we looked at "The Beatitudes". We began our session with the children searching for the emojis we had placed on the walls of the Hall. They were very good at identifying the emotions. We talked about how they felt today and they drew emojis for two different emotions to illustrate their feelings. We talked about the word "Blessed" and the phrase "Bless You". The illustration using a tea bag and water in a glass clearly showed the infusion taking place, illustrating how blessings will spread. Our action song was "God is Good to Me". We particularly like this song when we sing,"He gave us lips to eat our chips. God is good to me". We illustrated "Blessed are the Meek" – those who show caring, by making flowers with a chocolate placed in the centre. These were made to give away. We asked for God's blessings for ourselves and others as we wrote prayers to go on the Prayer Tree. We made "BEE HOTELS" using the plastic bottles, which members of the congregation had kindly saved for us. These bottles were decorated then stuffed with canes, twigs and moss to create a good, safe habitat for the bees and other insects. These were taken home to be placed in a suitable spot in the garden. We discussed "Blessed are the merciful". We prepared a pot to grow our small crop of cress to take home. We talked about how the cress can add a different taste to the food and how knowing God makes a difference in the way some people think and try to live their life. The Lego builders thought of a time when they had been "blessed" and built their answer representing, "love" and "community".

In April our theme was "Creation - God's Wonderful World". Our Snack was "growing trees". We used cheese spread to stick bread sticks on the paper plate and created a growing tree using grapes for the fruit. This was then promptly eaten. After the story we sang the action song "He made the stars to shine" and "All things bright and beautiful". The craft activities, illustrating what God created, included a lot of cutting and gluing skills as we made

baskets of flowers, moving fish, walking caterpillars, feathery birds and fingerprint bugs and insects. The Lego builders made their version of Creation and placed it at the back of the Worship Area to be admired.

Please keep the children and their families in your prayers and the FUN@CHURCH team Janet, Heather, Katie, Mike. Kate, Leo and Niall.

We would enjoy more help as we never know how many children, parents, grandparents and carers will arrive. If you would like to have "fun at church" on the 4th Wednesday of the month, do have a word with one of the team.

The annual accounts to the end of August 2022 have been independently checked and approved by the Church Council and are available for inspection on request.

They show the total held in all funds at 31/8/22 was £18,318, a reduction of £6,806 on the previous year. This is felt to be reasonable after a year of increased running costs, plus some high expenditure amounting to items £19,556, (Loan repayment £5000, Final Development project payment of 2.5% retention £6006, and retiling the roof over new coffee bar, kitchen, store, and plant room £8950)

We still have £15,000 to pay back to the Circuit over the next 3 years and I see no problem in achieving this.

CHARITABLE GIVING

Last year we gave £1101 to external charities, (before sending gift aid) which was raised by special appeals and services. Support for charities in this way will continue, and this year the Church Council agreed that we should donate £500 each to two charities that would be nominated by the Church Council each year. This year the charities chosen are Methodist Homes and All We Can, and these donations have been sent. The Church Council has also decided to donate the coffee donations received at Sunday services and monthly minimarkets to the Foodbank currently operating from Mountsorrel Baptist Church.

OFFERINGS AND GIFT AID

The year ending in August 2022 showed a fall in offerings of about 4% to £13685. This year offerings are expected to be about the same as last year, but at a time when all running costs, particularly fuel, have increased it is becoming more difficult to meet our expenditure so may I suggest that anyone who has not recently increased their giving to the church, to consider doing so if they are able.

There are different ways of making an offering to the church:

1. By Standing Order

Most people make contributions to the church by monthly standing order from their bank to the church bank account, and if the donation is from a taxpayer, the church can claim Gift Aid which increases the amount given by approximately 25%. Please see me for banking details if you want to set this up. If you are not a taxpayer, Gift Aid cannot be claimed on contributions made directly to the bank.

2. Using the Envelope Scheme.

I have sets of 52 dated envelopes, each set having its own number, and an offering can be put in an envelope each week, or when you want to, and placed on the collection plate at a service. When the collection is counted by the steward, the amount in the envelope is recorded with the envelope number, which making it possible to claim the 25% Gift Aid on cash or cheques if the donor is a taxpayer. If the donor is not a taxpayer, cash given in an envelope is still eligible for Gift Aid, but cheques are not.

3. On the collection plate

At every service there is a plate near the door where your gift (cash or cheque) can be placed. Cash donations made on the plate are eligible for Gift Aid, but cheques are not unless the signatory has made the Gift Aid declaration.

LETTINGS

Our good facilities are very popular and are used for weekly and monthly community activities, in addition to daily use by Barrow Playgroup. Since the last report, we now have a Karate class each Saturday night, which is open to everyone, and the back hall, coffee bar and kitchen are used regularly for children's parties. The income from these groups provides valuable support towards the cost of running our premises.

Our online presence continues to grow, with many enquiries coming through the website. In fact our last two christenings came from an enquiry made online.

Our Facebook page has over 200 followers, and having the website makes us much more accessible to the community both locally and further afield. We use it for outreach, advertising and showcasing our activities, and the ability for our friends further afield keeping in touch and up to date with our activities and fellowship. This is the 5th year of the website and have just renewed the registration for a further 2 years, taking us into 2025. There's a whole section on the Methodist website regarding individual church websites and you may have noticed the change of colour to 'Methodist red'.

Also using the resources on the Methodist website, I was able to add the videos from the "There is Room" material at Christmastime.

Having Wi-Fi helps enormously with the screens and music for Sunday services, especially if the preacher asks to play or show something, which we don't know about beforehand and it was also great for the drop-ins we had for the Jubilee and Coronation, enabling us to play videos and clips from YouTube to our visitors.

The AV supplier have told us of some software especially made for church services and this needs further investigation, but at the moment we are managing well with PowerPoint slides.

Currently, only myself, Peter and Adrian are fully trained with the system, with Heather able to do the sound. Also just to point out, the sound system does have an app that we can connect to on smartphone, so if you see me 'on my phone' during a service, it is because I am controlling the sound and not shopping online!!! Special thanks to Janet for producing the slides most weeks, with the pictures and the words displayed so well on the screen. There's always a theme to the slides, so can you try and work out the theme of pictures? We've had spring, animals, baby animals etc in recent weeks.

Main objective for this next year is to try and get more people trained up on the system, and to look at the new software.

These bookings all have to be checked, forms and invoices sent out, arrangements made for extra equipment, access arrangements made and locking up afterwards. Grateful thanks go to Peter who is there early every morning to check that everything is alright and that the heating is on if needed! We now have a new cleaner for the rear part of the building and Julie has settled in well and is doing an excellent job.

The Quinquennial inspection took place recently and thankfully did not show that any major work is needed – the electrical inspection has still to be done. The Property Committee will work through the inspector's suggestions in order of their priority.

Once again, thanks to everyone who helps in any way to keep our premises in good and safe order.

WORSHIP

One thing that we have learned from Lockdown is not to take for granted the tremendous privilege we have of coming together to worship our Lord. How we missed being able to meet together, and how we rejoice in our new found freedom!

We meet most Sunday mornings at 10.15 am to worship God with hymns, prayers, readings and a sermon or reflection by a minister or local preacher, or sometimes, now that fewer preachers are available, with a Local Arrangement service organised by the stewards. We are gradually getting accustomed to the use of the AV system to provide our music, and although it will never be the same as having our own organist we are grateful to have the technology available, and to those people who are able to work the 'magic' to make it happen. The beautiful pictures that accompany the slides are also very uplifting.

None of the current stewards are trained worship leaders so we rely heavily on online or printed material available when preparing a Local Arrangement, and we are especially grateful for "The Vine" complete services which we can download and adapt as necessary to suit our congregation. We usually try to make these services more informal and relaxed and more of a different style of service, often grouping the chairs around the coffee tables and taking our tea or coffee in with us, and occasionally including group discussion on issues raised in the service. At Pentecost we gathered in the Coffee Bar and celebrated the birthday of the church with bacon cobs and Danish pastries before sharing in hymns, readings, meditations and open discussion, which we all really enjoyed.

Over the next Quarter some of our services will be held at different times – two at 9.45am and one at 4pm – to cut down on the number of Local Arrangements needed over the holiday period. This won't be popular with everybody, but we hope you will bear with us as it will take a lot of pressure off the stewards. Please keep a watch on the notices or the website for details of these services.

Our worship is fairly informal, relaxed and friendly and we usually stay for coffee and a chat afterwards, so please feel free to join us either regularly or just for a visit as we come together to worship God.

"Music and Monologues" by Tilly and Peter Yates was very popular in April and was enjoyed by all. We recognise the effect of words and music on our well-being.


